Committed to Continuous Improvement

It has been five years since we began our Good to Great approach with schools, providing holistic, multi-year support to schools, ensuring more students can benefit from high-quality education. Since then, we have supported 14 schools in building out strategic improvement plans, reaching 7,649 students.

This past year, we partnered with the Center for Applied Research and Educational Improvement (CAREI) at the University of Minnesota to conduct an impact study of our Good to Great program, diving deep into the conditions and outcomes at schools that had completed a full cycle of planning and implementation. Through the evaluation, we hoped to learn whether the program was working, and how we could strengthen our approach to deepen our impact.

Through focus groups and interviews with 116 participants, document review, and data analysis **we confirmed that the Good to Great strategy works**. Key elements of the process, including consistent coaching and support, plan-aligned

flexible funding, and dedicated portfolio directors have supported effective implementation and successfully impacted both the conditions for school change and increased student achievement.

Good to Great is helping schools create customized roadmaps to achieve improved and sustainable student outcomes. All schools that participated in the study are making progress on important indicators such as, developing a culture of continuous improvement (85%)*, using data in decision making (85%)*, and building effective governance practices (78%)*. Because these essential conditions are in place, all schools in the study saw growth in MCA achievement levels for reading and math across grade levels.

The CAREI study allowed us to reflect on the past five years of Good to Great, zooming in on key measures for evidence of improvement and places to double down including norming around the improvement process, school-wide communications and staff retention practices.

Schools in our network are closing the opportunity gap, with 100% of our portfolio schools outperforming the Minneapolis average for low-income students.

The demand for resources like our **Minneapolis School Finder** is at an all time high, helping more families find a school that meets their child's needs.

And our broader coalition continues to band together in support of critical issues, such as advancing the **science of reading, and advocating for data-transparency**.

We are honored to do this work in support of students, and to work alongside so many dedicated educators, community leaders, families, and funders. Together, we are making change possible.

Great MN Schools [GMS] is having a transformative impact on schools in Minneapolis who are best positioned to achieve gap-closing results. When schools have strong leaders, supported teachers, effective operations, engaging curriculum, and a joyful, inclusive culture, students thrive. Our Good to Great approach involves helping schools think differently and building their capacity to make the necessary shifts that will support student experience and, ultimately, student outcomes.

In a city where income and proficiency are 85% correlated, our schools consistently beat the odds. This year, 85% of our schools outperform similar options, and every one of our schools exceeded the city average in reading progress. Across the city,

progress since COVID has remained relatively flat, while our schools are up 7% points on proficiency over the past 3 years.

One area where schools made particular progress this past year is databased decision making. By capturing and reviewing student data, teachers are able to, in real time, adjust lesson planning to address the greatest needs of their students.

New City School, a Great MN Schools portfolio school in its third year of Good to Great implementation, has been working with Great MN Schools to implement Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports (MTSS), a framework that ensures each individual child has what they need to succeed. Teachers are receiving Responsive Classroom training and have been working to implement individualized interventions. Data is being collected on interventions and a Child Study team meets weekly to discuss student progress.

Thanks to these efforts, between Fall and Winter 2024, all grade levels across the school saw an increase in students at or above grade level on the i-Ready assessment.



This year, alongside TNTP, Great MN Schools launched a Climate and Culture **Cohort**. The cohort is an opportunity for educators to explore strategies that foster nurturing educational environments that support both student and educator relationships and wellbeing. Research shows that a focus on school culture leads to increased teacher retention, attendance rates and student achievement.


The cohort experiences we are providing to Minneapolis schools are helping participants think differently

Great MN Schools is dedicated to increasing the number of students attending high-quality schools. This not only means helping schools do better, but also helping families find a great school that meets their needs. Schools are not one-size fits all, so our Minneapolis School Finder was designed to help families get clear and holistic information on school quality in order to find the best fit for their child. Through partnerships with local community organizations and Minneapolis Public Schools, we have been able to reach over 15,000 families annually as they look for a school that will meet their family's priorities and student's individual needs.

We also hosted our 2nd annual Minneapolis School Finder Fair in partnership with **Minneapolis Public Schools**,



which gives families an opportunity to talk to Minneapolis-serving district, charter and independent schools all in one place. Thank you to the 80+ schools and many community organizations who came together to support nearly 500 families in search of a school that meets their child's needs.



CHANGING PARTNERSHIPS BETWEEN SCHOOLS AND FAMILIES

92% OF PARENTS BELIEVE THEIR CHILD IS ON GRADE LEVEL, HOWEVER ONLY 48% OF MINNE-APOLIS STUDENTS ARE PROFICIENT ON THE STATE ASSESSMENT. THERE IS A VAST DISCONNECT BETWEEN CAREGIVERS' PERCEPTION AND THE REALITY OF STUDENT PERFORMANCE.

Engaged parents who have the information needed to better understand their student's current level of knowledge and skills are critical to ensuring every child is getting the support they need to be on grade level. To support families as strong partners in their child's education, Great MN Schools produces guides that are distributed by community partners directly serving families who will benefit most.



They build a needed bridge between educators and caregivers, and provide tips and resources for practicing skills at home and talking with teachers so that parents feel more confident engaging in their child's learning. The MN Family Standards Guides help families understand Minnesota

state learning standards and grade-level

expectations.

This year, we're excited to introduce new offerings, including grades 5-8, Pre-K, and a brand new literacy guide, 'How Children Learn to Read.' The response we have gotten for the literacy guides has been outstanding. In their first year of production, we have already distributed over 16,000 guides. Educators are using them as a resource with families to inform strong literacy practices, and community organizations are using them to spark dialogue and action with families in order to support student success.

We continue to listen to feedback from families in order to make the tools stronger and more accessible.

The glossary in the guide was incredibly helpful. In just a few words, it gave us parents the context we need to better support our children's learning. Before, I often struggled to communicate effectively with teachers, but the glossary changed that. It made a big difference for me, and I'm so grateful for how it's helped me support my daughter.

2024 was the best year yet for our partnership with Groves, a literacy learning organization. By providing students with foundational skills early, and supporting teachers with training and high-quality curriculum, the percentage of Groves supported students demonstrating proficiency at or above grade level in literacy more than doubled.

GHANGING HOW CHILDREN LEARN TO READ

A STRONG LITERACY FOUNDATION IS CRITICAL TO ACADEMIC SUCCESS AND A CHOICE-FILLED LIFE. YET FOR TOO LONG, STUDENTS DID NOT RECEIVE LITERACY INSTRUCTION GROUNDED IN THE SCIENCE OF READING.

GREAT MN SCHOOLS IS CHANGING THAT.

Ensuring that all students in Minneapolis are receiving high-quality literacy instruction will require engagement from educators, leaders, and organizations across our community.

Being able to read enables students to access, understand, and engage with

information across all subjects, enhance critical thinking, communications skills, and overall academic success. When students get clear and specific literacy instruction, grounded in the Science of Reading, 95% can learn to read at grade level without additional interventions.

To address our community's literacy needs, Great MN Schools provides coordination, facilitation and operational support to the Minnesota Literacy Coalition, operating as the backbone organization to this collective effort of over 80 local leaders working towards improved equity and excellence in literacy outcomes.



In just one year, the **Minnesota Literacy Coalition** has already shown the power of bringing people together to use their individual strengths and passions to influence a common purpose. To impact literacy in schools, homes, and the broader community three action teams have been established around key areas of need:

STRONG INSTRUCTION

The Strong Instruction team is working together to ensure strong curriculum, teacher training, and support for school leaders. This past year, the action team led a Literacy Leaders Cohort for 13 schools, 40 participants to deepen educator's understanding of the science of reading, and helped influence literacy curriculum selection at the district and new curricula implementation support across schools in the city.

FAMILY PARTNERSHIPS

The Family Partnerships team is working to expand access to literacy support inside and outside of school. To inform their work, they **interviewed families to better understand barriers to accessing out of school literacy supports**. The team helped make literacy resources more accessible by **distributing 1,000 literacy toolkits** with family-centered resources across the city.

ROBUST ECOSYSTEM

The Robust Ecosystem team is building the conditions needed to change the system through public awareness, state, and local policy. This past year they influenced the language of additional literacy legislation, including the allocation of resources to support teacher stipends for training, and rallied for support during Minnesota Literacy Day at the Capitol.

These coordinated efforts are helping prepare educators, engage families, and increase public support so that all children are recognized for their language assets and supported to acquire the literacy skills necessary to thrive.

We are all very thankful for the literacy kits for the families we partner with. Feedback that I received from the Connect for School Success Senior Social Workers when they provided families with the literacy kits includes the following: families loved them, said the flash cards are great, they like the game and fidget toy, they loved the books, families are thankful for them, and this gave the social workers an opportunity to talk about literacy with their families.

CHANGING CONDITIONS

When new policy language was introduced that would delay public reporting of the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment [MCA] test results, Great MN Schools, EdAllies, and Educators for Excellence MN took quick action to defend against this language to keep the data timely and relevant for all stakeholders.

We activated a coalition of 31 schools, authorizers, and community organizations, who sent letters to the **Minnesota Department of Education** [MDE] and the legislature, and sent emails or made calls to the conference committee members

and Commissioner Jett. The community worked together to present a quick and strong response so that the legislature and MDE better understood the many ways we use the MCA, and its importance to our collective work to address educational inequities.

Thanks to our strong, combined response we were able to preserve the original release date so that families, schools, and community organizations have the information they need to make informed decisions around school choice, understand relative school performance, and align resources around areas of highest need.



GET ON BOARD

Get on Board MN is a program designed to support individuals as they consider running for school board so that district leadership is more reflective of our diverse communities, leading to stronger, more inclusive solutions. This year we hosted our largest cohort yet, made up entirely of women of color, bringing the number of school board trained advocates to 24.

This program is offered through a collaboration between Ayada Leads, Northside Achievement Zone, Voices for Racial Justice, and Great MN Schools.
